

Elinor Carucci (Israeli-American, b. 1971)

Pride Collar (2016), 2020

A fellow at the Georgetown University Law Center bought this "Pride collar" for the Justice from a bead weaver in Ecuador. Ginsburg first wore it on the bench in 2016, prompting several journalists to ask if she was wearing it to send a political message. Ginsburg was a champion of LGBTQ rights during her career.

Husband Marty Ginsburg's words, "It's not sacrifice, it's family", 2020

All of Ginsburg's former law clerks gave her this collar at a reunion in 2018. Made by M.M.LaFleur, the collar's inner neck line is embroidered with a quote from her late husband Marty Ginsburg: "It's not sacrifice, it's family." Each layer on the piece refers to a member of the Ginsburg family. Ginsburg received this collar as a gift in late 2019 or early 2020 before the COVID-19 pandemic struck. It was one of her recent favorites; she said it was "elegant."

Court Collar, 2020


This large, doily-like collar was a recent present to Ginsburg and a favorite of hers at the Court before the COVID-19 pandemic.

Final Term and Lying in State at the Capitol, September, 2020

Ginsburg wore this collar several times during her final term on the bench, and it was the collar she wore after her death while lying in repose at the Court and lying in state at the Capitol in September 2020. 
Stiffelio Collar, the Metropolitan Opera, 2020

Ginsburg was a huge opera fan, and this collar is a copy of one worn by Placido Domingo. It was from a production of Stiffelio at the Metropolitan Opera, and when Ginsburg admired it, the Met gave it to her. Ginsburg protested that the performers would need it for the following night's production, but the Met told Ginsburg they would get another one.




University of Hawaii Jurist in Residence Collar (2017), 2020

Ginsburg was given this seashell collar by a student at the University of Hawaii when she was a jurist in residence in 2017.



South African Collar: Ginsburg's favorite collar, worn in her official portrait, 2020

This South African collar was Ginsburg's favorite of all. She wore it in multiple Court photos, in her own official portrait now hanging at the Supreme Court, and on the cover of TIME. 
International Women's Forum at the New Mexico Supreme Court Collar, 2020


2015 State of Union Address Collar, 2020

This was a 2013 gift from the Women's Law & Public Policy Fellowship Program and the Leadership and Advocacy for Women in Africa Fellowship Program groups from the Georgetown University Law Center. Ginsburg wore it during the 2015 State of Union Address.



Dissent Collar (2012), 2020

Ginsburg's famous "dissent collar" was made by Banana Republic and Ginsburg received it in a swag bag at the Glamour Women of the Year Awards in 2012. She said with a smile in an interview with Katie Couric in 2014: "It looks fitting for dissent."

Donald Trump's Inauguration Day Collar (2017), 2020

Ginsburg wore this collar- given to her by the Etsy artist who made it- on President Donald Trump's Inauguration Day in 2017. It barely withstood the day. Bundled amid the warm layers Ginsburg needed in the chilly weather, a strand on the collar broke and several beads fell off. (It was subsequently restrung.)



Oral Arguments Collar, 2020

After receiving this purple and gold beaded collar in 2018 or 2019, Ginsburg wore it in oral arguments before the pandemic.
